Elijah's Run

I Kings 19

1. Intro

- 1. Last week we saw God's encounter with the prophets of Baal.
- 2. Elijah prays and releases the rain after God proves Himself in control.
- 3. Elijah is on a high, he has been obedient to what the Lord has called him to.
- 4. But now we see him run in fear and comes to God in a state of despair. What has happened?

2. Fear

- 1. Jezebel is out to get Elijah (2)
 - 1. How can one who was just so successful in accomplishing what God wanted, now be found in a state of fear?
 - 1. Elijah expected revival in Israel. (18:4)
 - 2. He saw that Ahab and Jezebel did not immediately change to worship Yahweh.
 - 1. Was this why he raced Ahab to Jezreel, feeling that Ahab would change? (18:46)
 - 3. But when the threat came from the caged tiger, fear took over.
 - 1. One day's notice enhanced the fear.
 - 4. Compare: Twelve spies; Peter walking on water.
 - 1. When our eyes come off of the Lord, we shrink in fear.
 - 5. As one rides the crest of a wave, there is also a deep swell on the other side.
 - 1. Cannot stay on the mountain top. Much learning comes from the valleys.
- 2. Was there pride in Elijah after all he had accomplished through God?

3. The Journey

- 1. Elijah leaves his servant in Beersheba and goes into the desert. (3-4)
 - 1. Elijah is worn out.
 - 1. His fear and being tired leads him to depression.
 - 1. What was once seen as a victory is now seen as failure.
 - 2. He sits under and tree and has a pity party. (4)
 - 1. "Take me out of here, I am no better than my predecessors"
 - 1. Who said he was?
- 2. He is instructed by God to go to Mt. Sinai. (8)
 - 1. Here is the roots of seeking God
 - 1. There God had appeared to Moses when he was herding sheep.
 - 2. There He appeared to him when he gave the law.
 - 3. Elijah needed reaffirmation. (Israel had not repented immediately)
- 3. So he ends up at Sinai wondering why he was forsaken.
 - 1. From Beersheba to Mt. Sinai is about 14 day journey.
 - 1. It takes him 40 days. Any similarities?
- 4. In the same cave as Moses as the Lord passed by? (9) (Ex. 33:21-23).

4. His Yahweh Encounter

1. Elijah is still depressed.

- 1. His conversation with God is that he has been absolutely loyal, is the only one left doing the work for Yahweh and feels abandoned. (10)
- 2. God reproduces similar demonstrations of His power that he had done for Moses (<u>Ex 19:16-18</u>)
- 3. God is not in the wind or earthquake or fire.
 - 1. He is in the gentle breeze. (12)
 - 2. Even though God has revealed Himself in the dramatic, He is also in the stillness.
- 4. Elijah is not alone, God still has 7,000 other faithful followers that He will us.

5. Forwarding the Mantel

- 1. Yahweh next directed Elijah to return to Israel to do three things (15-16).
 - 1. Anoint Hazael as King of Syria.
 - 2. Anoint Jehu as King of Israel.
 - 3. Anoint Elisha as your successor.
- 2. Elisha was a farmer who lived near Abel-meholah (16)
 - 1. Throwing a prophet's cloak around a person symbolized the passing of the power and authority of the office to that individual.
- 3. Elijah anointed only Elisha personally (19-21).
 - He anointed Hazael and Jehu indirectly through his successor, Elisha (2 Kings 8:7-14; 9:1-3).
 - 2. Through these three men God would complete the purge of Baal worship that Elijah had begun (17).

6. Application

- 1. Fear and anxiety can lead to depression.
 - 1. Yet who is our provider?
 - 1. Eyes taken off of our redeemer.
- 2. Sometimes we seek God in the dramatic.
 - 1. Often He is found in the everyday things of life.
 - 1. We have to deal with the everyday things.
- 3. God can use anyone of us, dramatic or otherwise, but we need to be available.

7. Conclusion

- 1. We get 3 chapters covering Elijah's life.
- 2. We see him in different circumstances;
 - 1. Stopping the rain.
 - 2. Spending time with God, until an appointed moment.
 - 3. Rising to the challenge of showing who God is.
 - 4. Fleeing in fear of his life.
 - 5. Reconnecting with God.
 - 6. Passing on to another what God had given him.
- 3. He was a man just like us. (James 5:17-18)
